# From the desk of Nairn Gillies, SDHHS Executive Director

Happy New Year! It is with a thankful heart that I look back on 2020.

While so many people have suffered loss due to COVID-19, whether it is family, friends, or jobs, there is still much to be thankful for in 2020. Looking back on the decade there have been some major changes for the d/Deaf and Hard of Hearing community. Some that are life changing for the most vulnerable of Canadians. The Universal Newborn Hearing Screening, Bill C-81, Text 911, CVRS, to name but a few things that we can be thankful for. These changes really mean access for those who need it.

The Government of Saskatchewan has made American Sign Language interpretation available at information briefings at the legislature. Karen Nurkowski has attended over 90 medical health announcements with the Premier, Scott Moe, the Health Minister, Paul Merriman, and the Chief Medical Health Officer, Dr. Saqib Shahab. While these announcements are timely and critical for access, there has been a team at SDHHS producing public service announcements in ASL to clearly break down health directives and public health restriction information.

Where would we be without technology? ... Ava speech to text, iPhones, iPads, FaceTime, Skype, Google Meets, Zoom, all the meeting formats. These, while not in-person, are still live communication. Closed-Captioning on services such as YouTube or Netflix, all serve to reduce the impact of our isolation.

The Sign Language Institute of Canada (SLIC) had a meeting hosted on Zoom by SDHHS staff. Patti, Robyn, Nicole, and Rochelle, it was a fabulous success! It was nice to see so many people attend the online Zoom meeting featuring Angela Stratiy and Gary Malkowski. Watching the Deaf community discuss access to their own language made me see how privileged I am. I attended 12 years of public education where English (my language) was compulsory. Many of the Deaf that attended the meeting never had access to a formal ASL class in their entire school career. A clear message from d/Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals in this past decade has been that there is a need for standardized ASL across Canada. The key to a solid linguistic foundation is a national consensus to provide high quality ASL access at the earliest possible time, and to follow it from the early years throughout public education. To that end, advocates from Deaf organizations continue to call for change.

In closing, I would like to congratulate Patricia Spicer in her new role as President of the SCSD (Saskatchewan Cultural Society of the Deaf). The newly elected Board is a strong group of dedicated individuals who will represent the d/Deaf in Saskatchewan for years to come.

### Make or Bake... With POPCORN!

For a salty/sweet taste like popcorn from the fair.... Try making Kettle Corn!



### Kettle Corn Popcorn

½ cup popcorn¼ cup sugar¼ cup oil

Add ¼ - ½ tsp of salt after the popcorn has popped.

Mix the oil, sugar and popcorn into your pot and make it like you normally do. As soon as it has all popped, pour it into a large bowl and add the salt, stir and ENJOY!

### Popcorn Rainbow with Milk Paint - Craft Lets fill our hearts with rainbow colours!

#### YOU WILL NEED:

- Light blue construction paper
- ★ Popped popcorn
- ★ Milk
- ★ Food coloring
- ★ Small paintbrush
- ★ White glue







- Draw a half circle onto the paper and continue to draw 5 more for a total of 6 lines to make the rainbow.
- → Line the top line with white glue.
- Press the popcorn into the glue and continue until you have six layers.
- Mix food coloring into the milk to create red, orange, yellow, green, blue and purple.
- Use a small paintbrush to drop milk paint onto the popcorn.
- → Glue unpainted popcorn to the ends of the rainbow as clouds.

# Spotlight on Partnership and Inclusive Employment!

SDHHS partnered with Prairie Employment Program (PEP) in North Battleford to provide supports for a Deaf individual starting a new job with the Lone Star Hotel. PEP made the initial connection with the Manager at the Lone Star Hotel and then connected with SDHHS Vocational Services. Through the individualized funding we receive from the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training, SDHHS was able to purchase a smartphone for him to access communication apps to ease communication with his boss and with co-workers. We made Heat Transfer Vinyl decals and badges to add to his work safety vest (pictured below), and provided an ASL Interpreter for his training/orientation to the job. He is now successfully employed in the Maintenance Department at the Lone Star Hotel!

Happy New Year to everyone! 2020 was a year that affected so much in how SDHHS offers services.

To help stop the spread of the Covid-19 virus, interpreting switched over to a virtual format overnight. Since March, the interpreting department has effectively provided service through different platforms such as Zoom, FaceTime, Teams, Pexip, Webex, Facebook Messenger, etc. As we learned more about how to protect ourselves and limit exposure, we began to provide some in-person interpretation on an as need basis. The staff has had the opportunity to "team interpret" using Zoom. We have successfully tackled this a few different ways. Other than some technical glitches with Wi-Fi, it works fairly well. A positive from all of this is that interpreting services are relatively easy to provide anywhere in the province.

SDHHS continues to contract Freelance Interpreters when needed. Thanks to everyone for their flexibility and creativity on how to provide quality and confidential interpretation during these unprecedented times. Sue Schmid's hours have increased as of November 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020 and she will continue to work remotely from Prince Albert. SDHHS' priority is to hire an additional Interpreter in Regina.

Congratulations to Tyler and his wife on the safe arrival of their new son. Tyler has been on paternity leave and is back to work as of January, 2021.

Interpreting has been in the public eye this year with the Government of Saskatchewan providing interpretation of their Covid-19 updates. Thanks to Karen for being our Saskatchewan Covid-19 Interpreter ambassador. Another project that has occurred during Covid-19 is the Saskatoon Public Library using Deaf Interpreters to make their story time sessions on Saturday mornings more accessible. Thanks to Robyn

Holmes, Nicole Musey, Janet Dittrick and Rochelle Carty-Bauman for your great work in 2020 and we look forward to the new stories in 2021!

We expect that the office will close from time to time to ensure safety and reduce the spread of the virus. Interpreters are still available to work. Contact the office; calls will be answered during regular office hours.

#### **Happy New Year!**

I hope everyone had a great holiday season! Even though preschool is not the same as usual, we all are in it together during this difficult time and we truly believe we will succeed together.

Starting in the Fall of 2020, we decided to change things in our classroom to ensure we are following the rules and regulations established by the Saskatchewan Ministry of Education regarding COVID-19. CCCC Preschool developed a new cleaning protocol to sterilize toys, books, and surfaces. This allows us to facilitate a safe learning environment for everyone.

CCCC Preschool developed online learning and in-classroom sessions that easily transition from school to home. This blended-learning approach allows for greater family involvement and reduced exposure for vulnerable families. We are also excited that we developed the Craft Box, which is a great tool for online learning. The Craft Box is packed with various materials and was either picked-up by parents or dropped off at the student's home. The students are enjoying it! Each student receives more one-to-one time with the CCCC Preschool Teacher to work on sessions that include: Crafts, Storybooks, and Games. Each session is simple and sweet. We have focused and developed themes including Fall, Halloween, Cityscape, Winter and Christmas! In January, we will be doing an Arctic theme.

The emphasis is on family-based learning. This means we are working closely with the parents through meetings, SeeSaw, Zoom and Family Day Involvement to ensure that the students continue to have stimulation in learning and language development.


