### Executive Director's Message Nairn Gillies

Springtime is amazing.

Slowly the snow cover gives way to green grass, trees begin to bud and form leaves, and huge lines of geese form in the sky. Many exciting things have happened in this last quarter and like the arrival of the springtime, some of them happened with lots of flash and flare and others happened quietly. On Wednesday May 17th, Bill 103, "The Accessible Saskatchewan Act" was passed to Royal Assent and officially recognizes American Sign Language as the language of the Deaf in Saskatchewan.

The fact that Canada and Saskatchewan have moved forward to pass this kind of legislation is evidence that Canada's Deaf and Hard of Hearing community has been able to advocate for themselves and for future generations of Deaf and Hard of Hearing citizens. I have been to many meetings over the years with numerous Deaf and Hard of Hearing spokespersons, and I am so thrilled that I have seen this day finally arrive.

I am also very happy to see so many happy smiling young people from preschool age to young adults being served by our staff. We have built relationships all around the province for sign language supports, we have record numbers in our sign language classes, and the community is growing. Our sign language support outreach team has made contact with eight northern communities, and provides services for clients living in remote areas both in person and online.

Our language and literacy objectives are being met. As a follow-up to our pilot project with ASL Activity Kits, we have been making story books available online, in ASL, signed by Deaf and Hard of Hearing consumers from 4 to 84 years old. This exciting project has many spin-offs of language, learning, and access to literacy for Deaf and Hard of Hearing children all over the province who can access these books at any time.

The interpreting team and the video experts on staff are in the process of making the SGI Saskatchewan Government Insurance driver training materials accessible in American Sign Language. We have met with the leadership at SGI and showed them this project. We are looking forward to a continued relationship with other agencies to make their work accessible as well.

Deaf role-models have been very active in supporting Deaf and Hard of Hearing young adults to become active on boards, and in learning how to participate in our Saskatchewan community. I see leaders develop new ideas and programs that bridge gaps in service everyday. I am very proud to be part of this vibrant and growing Deaf community.



## Vocational Education & Employment Jody & Patricia

A long, difficult winter has finally ended. We are so glad to see Spring, at last! It means that we are preparing for driver training season! We have a few clients who are interested in taking driving training. We are excited that our new contract staff, Adam Stratychuk, is working on filming the SGI Driver's Handbook in ASL. When someone is taking driving training, they will be able to watch the video in ASL and reference the SGI Driver's Handbook at the same time.

Our new contract year with the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training started in October 2022. For the past 8 months, we have been working closely with clients to ensure they are receiving the supports they need in their education and employment goals. Recently, Patti was able to head to Saskatoon so both she and Jody could have an in-person meeting with our contract holder, the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training. It was great to be able to meet in-person instead of virtually.

In March of this year, one of Regina's VC clients received a full-time job offer from a manufacturing/packaging company. Patricia worked closely with the employer of the company to make sure that the new Deaf co-worker received support and services. We provided ASL/English interpreters for job orientation and training on the first 4 days of a new hire's employment. Recently Patricia received a call from this client stating that the new job was going well and they really appreciated her support.


On April 26, Winston Knoll Collegiate hosted an event called "Student Interest Conference". They had so many interesting guest speakers such as Costume Design and Theatre, Therapy Doggos, Fashion Design, Financial Literacy. Forensic Sciences, and MORE. They invited SDHHS to their conference. Rae-Mairi, Burton Bird and Patricia Spicer presented on 10 reasons why you should learn American Sign Language. They showed a list of careers that request and encourage people learn American Sign Language for their future. Then they taught the high school students some basic American Sign Language. About 30 high school students participated. The event was a HUGE success.

Now, in May, we have offered an ASL interpreted First Aid/CPR/AED class in Saskatoon. The company, BasicPlus Training has been wonderful to work with and is very accommodating for us. SDHHS is hoping to partner with another training company to offer Forklift and Skid Steer training while the weather is nice outside. ### ASL & EQUAL ACCESS MOVING FORWARD IN SASKATCHEWAN!

### **SDHHS VOCATIONAL SPOTLIGHT**



The Vocational Department at SDHHS was in contact with 6 residents across the province in regards to taking the SGI Driver Training. We are confident that there are many other Saskatchewan residents that would like to take this training as well, if it were available in ASL.

SDHHS has a limited number of qualified ASL Interpreters in Saskatchewan. Therefore, we needed to come up with a creative solution to providing the SGI Driver Training, in ASL, to these 6 people in 4 different locations. As we all know, having a Driver's License increases employment opportunities by more than 50%! So it was imperative for us to figure out a way to get equal access to the SGI Training Manual. Normally, SDHHS would book 2 Interpreters for each day of training, pay for travel and accommodations, meals, and wages, to provide in-class training to our DHH clients. As you can see, this would be costly to accomplish in a variety of locations.

Through some of the Vocational Department project funding provided by the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training, SDHHS was able to hire, on a short contract, a Deaf individual with a vast amount of experience in the driving/towing industry, and who has advanced knowledge with filming and video editing. This person's' name is Adam Stratychuk. Adam has the exact skills and qualifications that we need for this project! He and our Staff Interpreters are currently working on translating the written English to ASL, from which he will film those translations and then edit the videos to ensure a professional-looking, finished project for DHH Saskatchewanians to learn from.


Adam was born profoundly Deaf and had very supportive parents who encouraged him to learn ASL throughout his childhood. They even committed to attending a Deaf Preschool in Burnaby BC to give him every opportunity for success. They wanted Adam to grow and flourish! Adam has a Cochlear Implant but stopped using it when he was about 4 years old. It was too much stimulation for him to handle and was creating health concerns. Adam developed a strong English structure in his High School years, and started his career in the towing industry while still in High School as well. Recently, Adam left his driving/towing employment of 11 years, because he felt he needed a change.

### SDHHS VOCATIONAL SPOTLIGHT Continued...

Adam wrote the following to include in this article: "I left a high-paying job because I feel despair for the D/deaf and Hard of Hearing people in our community. Many do not get to experience the enriching life I had growing up in Saskatchewan. One major distinction between Deaf people and other linguistic minority groups, is that Deaf people do not enjoy automatic access to much needed life solutions through their parents. In spite of their minority status, in almost all other linguistic minority groups, families speak the same language within the household.

The purpose at SDHHS is to give people the access to the needs in their life. The purpose of the SGI project is because of the recognized need, and because equitable accessibility is the right thing to do. SGI's online practice quiz provides translation of 152 languages (if I counted right). There is no ASL on the translation list even though ASL is a true and provincially recognized language. It is important to the D/deaf and Hard of Hearing community in Saskatchewan to have this kind of access in their lives. Being that we are car-dependent in most of Canada, people are more likely to be hired for a job if they hold a valid driver's license. Current job listings have approximately 54% of advertisements requiring a valid driver's license. A driver's license is not only good for employment, it is a milestone achievement giving the freedom and independence people require to drive around to meet their needs. Drive to appointments if they are not within transportation service areas, visiting their beloved relations, the list goes on.

We believe that giving full ASL access to the SGI's handbook will give our clients even more opportunity and free them of some of the frustrations they may struggle with because more often than not, English is not their first language or their English is weak in structure. While an Interpreter in-person provides access to ASL, it may still confuse Deaf individuals coming from a Hearing Interpreter. That's where I'd pop in, breaking the barrier for the D/deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals where 'by Deaf for Deaf' in ASL provides full access."

### Sign Support Professional Alanda

My name is Alanda McLeod. I have volunteered with SDHHS for many years and have gained many experiences in the Deaf community. I was given the opportunity to work as a Sign Support Professional starting last March. It has been thrilling for me to be a part of the SDHHS team! I am feeling very welcomed working here at SDHHS. My world has changed a lot because I have access to full communication with my co-workers and the clients that I work with, as sign language is my language.

As a Sign Support Professional, I have a variety of duties. It has already been a great opportunity for me to further develop skills and begin with community relationship-building. I love learning and being in a learning environment. I understand how important it is to serve the community as individuals participating in charitable activities, and by helping people in need.

So far I have helped with the preschool, and watching the students' skills grow inspires me. I thought it would be a challenge to communicate with children under 5 years old but sign language helps us to understand each other well! One of the students came to the 4C Preschool with no language and they had high levels of frustration. I started working one-to-one with them, teaching sign language in hopes of improving their ability to better share their experiences with us. Communication helps strengthen the bond with the students.

I became an ASL teacher last January and I wanted to motivate ASL students to be involved in our community because of their desire to learn ASL. Since then, I have started hosting community Deaf Social Nights. The ASL students have really enjoyed connecting with and meeting Deaf and Hard of Hearing community members, as well as others who are learning, or are already fluent in ASL!

Currently I am supporting a variety of clients ranging from children to adults. I am teaching ASL and Life skills. The clients enjoy the baking and crafts I plan for them!

I have given presentations to the Medical Students at the University of Saskatchewan, and to the Peter Ballantyne Cree Nation (Wounds into Wisdom group) at Prairieland Park.

I look forward to continuing to improve myself and others through ongoing, wonderful experiences with SDHHS. I am excited to start working with editing ASL children's stories, attending camps to learn and assist, and so I can work with a camp team in the future for the Deaf community. 


**SSP – Southern Community Work:** I've had some new additional youth to work with and continue to build ASL resource support systems for my clients.








We typically start our morning with free play for an hour as we have many activities for them to complete with


#### Spring ASL classes are in full swing!

### Government Training Event

The Government Relations and Advocacy Training took place in Regina this spring, and it was very informative. Joel Petereson provided us with an overview of how government works, how to advocate and lobby the government for change for our community, as well as a bit about legislature. As Dan D'Autremontt called it Legislature 101. One of the takeaways from the day was the importance of relationship building. Through these relationships with our MLA, and Cabinet Ministers we are able to step into the culture and language of the legislative process, and begin to engage in critical conversations about what is important and necessary for the quality of life for Deaf and Hard of Hearing people in Saskatchewan, and what it means to live in Saskatchewan as a Deaf and Hard of Hearing person without barriers. We have a lot of work ahead of us to continue to formulate and cultivate these relationship. Inviting the right government officials into our community events may be more impactful than a protest or a rally. This will give an opportunity to experience communication while interacting at a Deaf/Hard of Hearing event. We need to be solution focused. What are the change we desire? Start small and think big; have short term goals and long term goals. If we frame our desired change in line with government's vision, "Saskatchewan is a great place to live, work and do business," we are then communicating in a language this government understands. Advocating for the best interest of the Deaf community is our goal. Communicating what we believe in can be difficult, and emotional at times. Through this training, we have a better understanding of the process to be able to advocate and lobby the government for positive changes for the lives of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community!




